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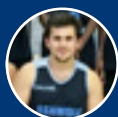
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MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

Ashmole Academy, for example, is set to lose around 14% of its budget which is very substantial and will have a huge effect on our ability to run the school as it is now; there will be some very difficult decisions to make as these cuts start to impact. I will update everyone of these developments as more becomes known. Similarly, the accounts of teacher shortage, particularly in the London area are accurate, a challenge faced by every school.

Moving away from concerns to more positive news; as the end of the Spring Term draws nearer and the winter sports season comes to a close, it is great to see the success achieved by all of our teams. Year 11 won the Barnet Cup in Football; the Year 11 Basketball team won both the League and Cup and Year 9 footballers won the Barnet League. The Senior Netball team won the Barnet League; the Year 10 Netball team were runners up in their league and the U13 girls Football team were runners up in a Year 7/8 tournament. Fantastic performances all round!

Many other exciting things are occurring across the Academy. Our links with the Primary School has seen the start of Spanish and French lessons to the Reception children. Music and PE lessons will also occur in the summer term.

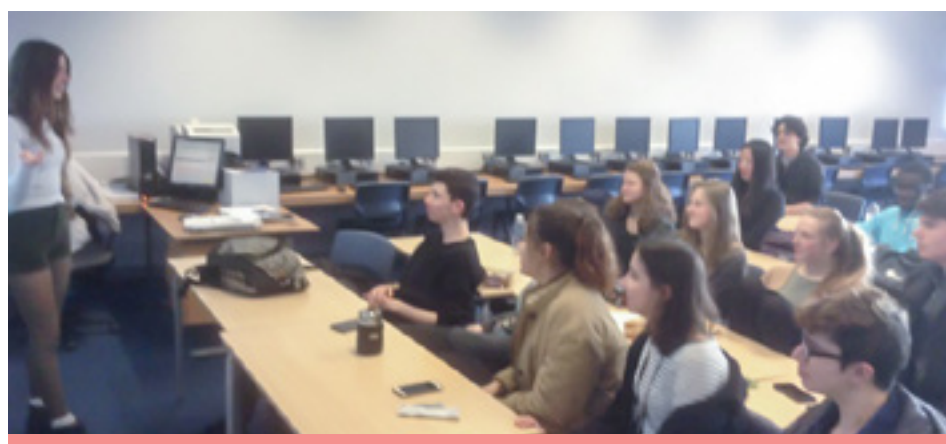

The Intermediate Maths Challenge was taken by students in Year 9 – 11. Ten of our students have received a Gold certificate which is an outstanding achievement considering you need to be in top 6 - 7% of students that took part nationally to achieve this.

The Coca Cola RBC Business Challenge was held in 11 different regions across the UK and in London we beat 133 teams to get in the top 10 and be invited to the regional finals on the 2nd February in the Kia Oval, Kennington.

Upon our arrival we were sat at our own table in a large room with the rest of the teams. We were then given a briefing on our task for the day and introduced to our Coca Cola mentor who helped us with all of our tasks. Our job was to pitch a fundraising event and other ways to spread awareness for the charity 'Special Olympics Great Britain'. We split ourselves into two teams - fundraising and communications.

Each team had different jobs to do and deadlines to meet for each, and finally present our pitch to a panel of judges and the other schools at the end. Fundraising had to come up with an original event idea, keeping to the budget and working out the estimated profits.

They then had to send an email to the judging panel, requesting the resources they needed for the event, which the judges looked at to test their professionalism.

Finally, they created the PowerPoint with all of the information about the event which was to be shown at the end. Communications had to come up with creative advertisements to support the charity: a radio advertisement that they got to record and edit, a bus stop poster advertisement that will be posted around the region because of our win and an infographic all about the charity. At the end of the day, we had to present it professionally and explain our event and our ideas for it. As we won the Regional Competition, our work will be entered alongside the 10 other regional winners and invited to an event where the overall national winner is announced.

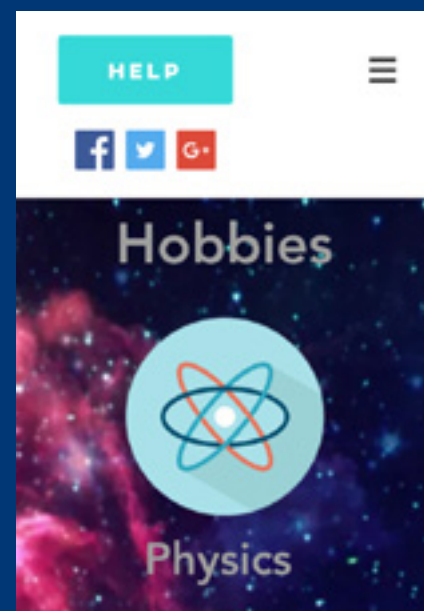

SPANISH AT ASHMOLE PRIMARY SCHOOL

Educational research suggests that early exposure to different languages fosters intellectual skills and habits in school and in later life. This will allow children to become better at problem solving; become better critical thinkers; be creative; have enhanced memory skills and be better at multi-tasking. International studies have shown that pupils learning an additional language do better on both verbal and maths tests. We would hope that this new learning will also contribute to children having a clearer understanding in both English and Maths.

As a brand new school we wanted to take advantage of this opportunity to learn a language at an early age by using the expertise

from teachers at the secondary school and continue to teach the language until they reach Key Stage Three and beyond. Mr Barnes, Assistant Head Teacher at Ashmole Academy and Miss Moon (Gifted and Talented teacher at the Academy) are leading half an hour Spanish lessons every week.

Learning an additional language will open many more doors to individuals in life. This will support our school values and help to foster the ethos of outstanding behaviour, excellent relationships and high pupil outcomes. The pupils will grow into confident speakers. So far results indicate a very positive outlook in the Early Years for all areas of learning.

CLASS CHARTERS IN RECEPTION

Both Reception classes have created new class charters. The children have worked together to generate their own class rules to ensure a safe and happy classroom. They have worked together to make a 'Class Charter' display. This is displayed in a prominent place in each classroom, to remind the children how we should all behave to ensure we get the most out of our time at school.
