OPPORTUNITIES BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

Upon leaving Ashmole, maybe you will study geography. Or perhaps you've decided that law is for you. Or alternatively, you will become an embryologist, like Lucy Richardson.



As an ex-Ashmole pupil, Lucy recently visited us to deliver an incredibly insightful talk about her career. With a PhD from the University of Cambridge, she has worked as an embryologist for 14 years. She began by explaining the scientific basis behind the work she does, outlining the factors that cause infertility and the treatments available for such patients. These include IVF and ICSI, which are two of the innovative developments commonly used by Lucy and other professionals in her field. She also discussed certain ethical issues that arise. Is it right to genetically screen embryos to select the healthiest? Should IVF be funded by the NHS or is treatment of disease, like cancer, more important? And success rates are low, so is it worth it?

The talk was truly fascinating and a great opportunity to ask an expert in the field questions about this cutting-edge science. I feel very fortunate to have gained greater understanding of the realities of science beyond the

As of 6th December, 5 of the Ashmole teams were ranked in the top 500 out of the 6000+ teams nationwide including 'Gordon Gecko' who are currently ranked second.

ENGLISH & MATHS

SENIOR MATHS CHALLENGE

The Senior Maths Challenge is taken by students in Year 11 - 13, where four of our students have received a Gold certificate which is an outstanding achievement considering you need to be in top 6 - 7% of students that took part nationally to achieve this. In particular it's impressive that Ifeanyi Okechukwu in Year 11 and Aliaksei Kuratau in Year 12 received a Gold certificate. Aled Jenkins and Roberto Lau-Soto in Year 13 have not only done well to receive a Gold certificate but scored high enough to go onto the Kangaroo round, which is the European round of Maths Challenge.

'PIGEON ENGLISH' REVIEW

As part of my GCSE Drama course, we went to see the play 'Pigeon English' at the Ambassadors Theatre in London on Wednesday 12th October 2016. I thought it would be sad throughout, tragic and dramatic but instead they used a number of comical moments to create an element of relief for the audience. I appreciated this and thought it was effective. I also believe this was the intention so it would surprise the audience and make them more interested because of the humour.

An effective moment was when the playground was set on fire and Harri and the other characters were reacting to this moment. Harri was reciting what had happened for the audience while he and the other character were moving around the stage. To create the illusion of fire, there was an red/orange wash of lighting and smoke. This highlighted what was happening for the audience and made the situation of the fire more realistic. Harri was reciting his lines to the audience which drew the audience in and made them connect with the character and the situation: it also broke

the fourth wall, a common technique applied throughout the play. Furthermore the focus was entirely on Harri, with only him delivering dialogue at this moment. I believe this was highly effective and purposeful. He applied a wide range of vocal expression including a heavy Ghanaian, deep tone, loud volume and emphasis on his incorrect intonation to demonstrate the fact that English was not his first language. as he recited his lines very loud and clear so it was easy for the audience to understand.

In conclusion, I believe the play was a very good piece of drama with brilliant acting, as the actors applied great vocal and facial expression, as well as effective use of movement. The design improved the delivery of the play and made it more interesting for the audience as they were focusing on the brilliant acting skills of the actors but were impressed by how a simple set was adapted throughout.

MATHEMATICS TALK

On Wednesday 16th November, we had Professor Simon Shaw from Brunel University come to talk to Years 11-13 about the usefulness of Maths in the world, and Maths beyond Secondary School level. Professor Shaw was initially a Mechanical Engineer, having studied mechanical engineering as his undergraduate degree and becoming an engineering designer of desktop dental X-Ray processing machines. However, he returned to higher education to study Computational Mathematics and now specialises in the same field, where his research interest lie in the computational simulation of partial differential Volterra equations and he has published over thirty research papers.

The talk started off with the idea that Mathematics can allow someone to see the world differently, and in doing so, people can interpret observations of the world in a more logical and innovative way than normal. This led onto more about the field of Engineering, and how Mathematics and the Sciences can be utilised to help solve sustainability issues, increase efficiency in production, improve design of vehicles and aircrafts, and even further biological and medical research.

Furthermore, another topic discussed was the

growing issue in the lack of children, young people, and especially girls who take an interest in Mathematics, Computer Science and Engineering. For example, at the moment the Women's Engineering Society states that out of all Engineering and Technology undergraduates in the UK, only 15.8% are females. Therefore, there is a desperate need for diversity in these fields of study, and Professor Shaw felt very strongly as we touched upon this during the

Ultimately, Professor Shaw ended the talk by showcasing a portion of one of his students' dissertations. The research project was on a special field of mathematics called Fluid Dynamics, which encompassed the calculations of the speed of air flow and pressure around an aerofoil (aeroplane wing).

I feel extremely privileged to have been able to talk with him more afterwards, and also very thankful to the Miss Sriraman and Mr Fleeman within our Maths Department that organised the talk for us. This has really inspired me to look at Mathematics with a different and more open perspective on how interesting and inventive Mathematics can really be.

Former students **Antony** and **Harry Zacharias** who left in 2013 and who are both studying medicine at UCL, recently won this award for their leadership of 'Save a Baby's Life' project.

UCLU Student-Led Project of the Year 2015/2016

Save a Baby's Life is a voluntary organisation, run by UCL students in conjunction with the royal Life Saving society since 2011. They teach infant and child life-saving skills (cardiopulmonary resuscitation, drowning and choking) to anyone will to learn. One of Ashmole Primary School's key priorities is to ensure the school is outstanding through outstanding teaching

outstanding through outstanding teaching and learning. The club aims to contribute to the overall ethos and values of the school. The team interact with the children and encourage positive social skills and excellent behaviour. The children are engaged in various fitness activities and the clubs provide children with additional activities which they can play with their friends indoors too.

As a club, we aim to provide a range of healthy choices of food through our menus in the morning and afternoon, taking in to consideration all children who have special dietary requirements. We currently have sixteen children per day in our Breakfast and After School club. There is a huge demand for more places which we will be able to provide once the new school premises have been built. To date, we have received very positive feedback from all of the parents of our children as the Breakfast and After School Clubs support our parents to balance work and family commitments, whist also providing their children with a range of experiences and interests in a safe and secure environment.

TEACHING AND LEARNING IN THE EARLY YEARS

At Ashmole Primary School the staff are aware of the importance to be highly responsive to the needs of all our children. The children have been highly motivated and are always eager to join in with all the exciting learning opportunities set up by Miss Panayi and Miss Costas. The staff have developed excellent relationships with the children this term and have encouraged the children to ask many questions in class. The children have undertaken many practical activities, used small whiteboards, focussed on number work, phonics and writing as well as role play opportunities in the class environment.

The classrooms are engaging and full of new, exciting resources for the children to explore. Both classrooms ensure there are areas set up that match the demands of the Early Years Curriculum. They have highly engaging maths areas, writing areas, reading areas, role play areas, craft areas, technology areas, construction areas, investigation areas and various places in the classroom where they can explore malleable resources. Each day activities are

set up to encourage children to develop their learning through play. As well as this, children are given the opportunity to select their own activities and resources to learn with as Child Initiated Learning plays a very large part in the Early Years Foundation Stage.

The school day in Reception consists of daily phonics and maths lessons, as well as a daily topic based lesson. We also have weekly PE sessions. We use Letters & Sounds as well as Jolly Phonics when planning exciting phonics lessons for the children. During phonics, children recap their learning and then learn a new sound each day. They then apply this new sound in various ways including, songs, games, writing on mini whiteboards, using magnetic letters to build words, as well as practical games. The classroom environment then allows them to continue these games if they choose to. Videos of what the children are learning are uploaded on to our school website so that parents have access to what the children are learning and can help to consolidate this at

THE OUTDOOR LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

It is an important requirement in the Early Years Foundation Stage that children have access to outdoor play and therefore it is imperative that the outdoor provision provides just as much learning as the indoors. All children at Ashmole Primary School enjoy playing outside and exploring their surroundings. We view the outdoor provision as an extension of the indoors and the children can access this throughout the day. Through careful planning and using resources efficiently, the outdoors at Ashmole Primary School provides children with vast learning opportunities benefiting many areas of their learning and development. The outdoor provision can be a place where children fully immerse themselves in all types of learning as well as being a great place for practitioners to offer children activities on a larger scale.

The outdoor area covers all areas of the Early Years Foundation Stage curriculum. The provision includes: a construction area, a sand bay, a water wall, a mud kitchen, a climbing frame, a music wall, a sensory tent, a reading corner, a literacy area, a maths area, a role play corner and a small stage. In addition, the children have the opportunity to ride bikes and
