Dear Parents, Carers, Students and Friends,

The Spring Term is so busy with Parents' Evenings, Year 7 Poetry Evening, the Music concert and so many more events. The typical attendance at Parents' Evenings for example is often in the range of 95%! That is an impressive turnout. Thank you for your support and commitment.

This term has had its sets of challenges, security at Southgate being one of many issues facing the school and community. We have worked hard with you and the police to see if improvements can be achieved. As we approach the end of term, the police have reassured that extra police presence will be available during this time to ensure that Ashmole students can go home safely. Our staff will continue to be vigilant and have a presence around Southgate.

This year's round of admissions has seen a bumper year of siblings, the biggest ever. It is great to see so

many parents wanting to continue to send their other children to the school. Based on distance, the number of offers has declined

as a consequence, now going out to around 0.4 miles. Governors will be looking carefully at the admission criteria for future years to maintain siblings as an important criteria for the school and achieve more admissions on distance as well.

Some of you have raised the issue of halal food at the Academy. Governors have agreed to offer halal food within our range of options twice a week. Students can choose a halal dish if they wish. All other offers on our menu will continue so students can still choose non-halal food on those days.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRIMARY HEAD

Dear Parents, Carers, Students and Friends

We have had a very busy term at Ashmole Primary School, with so many exciting events in which the children have participated. The APPTA have kindly donated £10,000 to support the purchase of the new climbing equipment for KS1 and a further £1,000 towards the Early Years Outdoor Play area. This term we have focussed on Road Safety, with children creating banners; Bling Your Bike to school day; a Superhero day and we participated in the Big Pedal. The children have also produced some fantastic posters based on our Values of Positivity, Humour, Respect and Appreciation.

With the support of the Academy's Music Department, instrumental lessons have commenced for pupils in Year 2. We look forward to hearing all about their musical achievements over the coming weeks.

Since the school opened in 2016, the DfE and various Challenge Consultants have constantly monitored us. The school has many great features that have put us in a very strong position to be judged outstanding in our

future Ofsted inspection. Our pupil results in attainment and progress indicate that we are on track to be outstanding. The Early Years Foundation Stage results in the last two years have been well above the national average, with 85% of the cohorts achieving a 'Good Level of Development'. In Year 1, our Phonics' results were 98.3%, which again was well above the national average. Our targets for the current Year 2 cohort in Reading, Writing and Maths are also on track to be outstanding in July 2019, and well above the national average.

We are very pleased with the overall direction of the school and will always aim to offer an outstanding education for all our pupils.

What are you doing now?

I left Ashmole in the summer of 2015 and started at Newcastle in the September. My first two years were mainly lecture based but for my 3rd year, I was on clinical rotations in hospitals and GP surgeries in and around County Durham.

At Ashmole, I mostly gained a tenacity to achieve. I had to work hard, but I may not have achieved as I have without it. In the Sixth Form, there was so much guidance from staff on how to enrich your application for university. This definitely improved my confidence to apply for a Russell Group. There were also many opportunities to improve public speaking skills





with mock interviews and lunchtime activities like Philosophy Society. This helped me to deliver a strong interview to secure my place at medical school.

The most valuable part of MedSoc was having ex-students come and speak to us about their experience of applying for Medical School. This definitely gave me the motivation and necessary knowledge to make my own successful application to medicine. Current affairs debates were engaging and brought me up to speed with changes in the profession.

VISIT TO GREENWICH THEATRE





On 12th February, Year 12 and 13 English students viewed a modern adaptation of the Shakespearean classic: The Tempest. The unconventional setting of the theatre added to the abstract choices of the director, enabling him to incorporate and celebrate elements of the 21st century. The Lazarus Theatre Company presented an entirely different interpretation of the Shakespearean play, for example in the regendering of the characters. It is interesting to think that in the 1600's only men were allowed to perform on stage; witnessing a new creative interpretation of the play enabled us to see the play in a totally different and modernised light. The director reflected the current concerns around gender fluidity through unconventional casting choices. Similarly, we saw minor characters, Sebastian and Antonio, take on a female perspective too, the director's subtle nod to female empowerment and its importance.






PRODUCT DESIGN COMPETITION WINNER

them get their hair and makeup touched up constantly, and we saw them rehearse what they were going to say. There were many cameras and lights in the studio in certain positions to ensure the shots were correct. There were also so many members of the crew and it was amazing to see how many there were just for a 30 minute show.

Once the show went on air, we were told when to laugh and clap almost immediately. It was fascinating to see in the intervals of the show how the crew quickly organised the cameras and lighting, everything was done very quickly. The guests on the show that day were Lily Collins and David Oyelowo, and it was very

interesting to watch them talk about their acting and their careers. They focused on 'Les Miserables' as well as some letters written by people in the UK which were never delivered. Some of us even managed to appear on camera when the camera panned around the studio quickly.

Overall, The One Show was a great experience to watch how a real life popular show is put together. It was fantastic to see a different perspective to how we usually watch it on the screen, and I really enjoyed watching how they recorded a show so professionally in such a small studio.



LSSO CONCERT





Apps to look out for:




Yubo. This app used to be called Yellow and has now been renamed. It has been nicknamed

by some as 'Tinder for Teens'. This app has many new features such as live streaming, group video chats and instant messaging. Yubo allows you to make new friends, chat and meet new people. You swipe right if you like and left if you pass. If two people like each other's pictures, they can chat privately.



Snapchat Streak. Is this harmless fun? Snapchat is one of the most popular social media apps used by young people to share photos and videos with

friends. A Snapchat 'streak' is when you have snapchat friends send and return a Snap to each other with a 24-hour period. A number and emoji appears beside a Snapchat friend's name corresponding to the number of days in a row a new picture or video has been sent back and forth. You must Snapchat your friend within 24 hours of receiving the last Snap to keep the streak going. Young people have been pressured into keeping a streak going and when the streak stops, it can cause problems.



Fortnite. This is an online shooter that starts with 100 players and leaves one winner standing. Battle Royale sees 100 players

parachute onto an island, and the last player alive wins. Each game lasts for 20 minutes. The National Crime Agency has warned that Fortnite is putting some children at risk due to the chat facility. Players can talk and type what they want to each other and can have the potential to be exploited through grooming.



Monkey. This app allows children to talk to strangers. It connects you randomly to another person who is on the site, and lets

you talk to them in a one to one video chat.



Secret Calculator.

Calculator hides private photos and videos behind the calculator. It looks like a calculator but if you put in a

passcode, it will open up a private area, where you can talk to anyone online.



What can I do right now?

Look through the guidance that was provided in the last newsletter, as a reminder of the key areas:

- Familiarise yourself with the privacy settings and reporting features available on popular sites, services and apps.
- ▶ Encourage your child to 'think before you post'. Online actions can impact not only yourself but the lives of others. Content posted privately online can be publicly shared by others, and may remain online forever.
- Create a family agreement to establish your children's boundaries, and your expectations, when on the internet.

SAFER INTERNET DAY



The need to educate our young people about online safety is an important part of our work here at Ashmole. Whilst all years receive regular reminders and key messages about online safety, we think Safer Internet Day is a fantastic opportunity to highlight how positive the internet can be, but also the negative impact it can have if not used appropriately.

On 5th February, we celebrated this year's theme of Online Consent with assemblies and tailored tutorial sessions targeting the needs for each year group. The clear message that was discussed this year was how young people need to consider how they give and receive online consent for posts, communication, uploads and information sharing. Along with this discussion of the positives of safe internet use, was also an exploration of the pitfalls of data sharing and issues surrounding privacy. Students were also asked to focus on considering the impact sharing posts and pictures of others, without their consent, has on those young people involved and how you can avoid friendship issues by being open and respectful when using social platforms. Students shared their top tips for safe and appropriate internet use and we will continue to work with our students to help them lead safe and fulfilling online lives as well as offline.

YEAR 8 BARNET NETBALL TOURNAMENT




Aiya, Olivia, Leah, Giorgia, Magdelena, Louisa, Anjali, Maisie and Elena
