YEAR 12 OSCAR PISTORIUS WORKSHOP WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF LAW

Ashmole Year 12 students interested in Law took part in a workshop conducted by the University of Law on the Oscar Pistorius trial. We began by hearing Oscar's defence, assessed the reliability of his account, and acted as Oscar's defence lawyer. This was incredibly interesting, as we had to defend a man who had been found guilty of murder, and has been sentenced to 13 years in prison. This also made it quite challenging, as we had to open our minds to the possibility that the death of his girlfriend, Reeva Steenkamp, was in fact an act of self-defence.

We then heard the perspective of Michelle Burger, a neighbour of Oscar Pistorius and analysed her story to judge whether she had been telling the truth or not, and whether we would be able to use her point of view as evidence for our own case. Throughout the hour, we were constantly fed invaluable tips



and information about how law is put into practice in a real life case. We were taught vital skills that solicitors and barristers use in their everyday life, something that would massively benefit anyone wanting to work as a lawyer in the future.

The session only ran for an hour, yet the representative of the university was happy to answer any questions and the workshop ran over time, reflecting how eager we were! It was a great experience for everyone who attended as not only was it informative, but it was also highly engaging. The experience definitely improved my understanding of criminal law, and it is something I can write on my personal statement when applying for university.

INSIGHT INTO INVESTMENT BANKING





CMS MCKENNA



On 30th April, the members of LawSoc received a talk from two lawyers from the global law firm CMS McKenna. It recently expanded and joined with two other smaller firms: Nabarro and Olswang, and is now sitting as the sixth largest law firm in the world.

They first spoke to us about the different types of law degrees and entry requirements on offer to us at the most respected universities. These included dual honours, 'sandwich' degrees and courses with one year in industry. We also learnt about conversion courses, if we were to do something other than law (or dual honours) at university. They then introduced us to the LNAT, an admissions test some universities require for admission to their courses. It helped us all to grasp the true extent of the commitment required to get into law school.

Next, they spoke to us about the law practised at CMS and the summer courses they offer. We found out that they specialise in real estate, tax and technology but do not deal with criminal law. They also mentioned their summer placements and vacation schemes for students or recent graduates, which we all found motivating and exciting, as this could apply to us in the future

The talk was very informative and inspired many of us to research more about the subject we are interested in and seriously consider law as a possible career path.

University: Cambridge University **Course:** Chemical Engineering

Graduating: July 2019

I left Ashmole in 2015 and I am currently in my third year out of four at Cambridge studying Chemical Engineering. My first two years involved a mixture of practicals and lectures alongside supervisions, which is unique to the Cambridge system, and involves going through calculations and questions in groups of up to three with a supervisor, who is an expert in the field you are studying. This year I have fewer practicals and more individual study and projects to complete. However, I still have a lot of lectures and supervisions throughout the week.

I was a part of the Oxbridge programme during my time in the 6th Form. This involved weekly



meetings where we would be helped with applications and then interview preparations. The support I was given through the Oxbridge programme and by various members of staff, meant that when my interview did eventually come around, I was prepared.

OXFORD UNIVERSITY IMMUNOLOGY TALK



I was very lucky to be part of a talk led by Dr Ben Owens who has an undergraduate degree and PhD in Immunology. Spending eight years in research, Dr Owens is currently working as part of a large pharmaceutical company called EUSA Pharma and alongside this is a lecturer at the University of Oxford. During the talk, he gave us in-depth knowledge on the structure and function of antibodies, and spoke about the types of infections that they are able to protect us from. This was particularly useful as I was able to understand and incorporate the information he had given within the Biology specification. To further improve our understanding, Dr Owens explained the industrial uses of antibodies and how they are turned into drugs, as well as examples of illnesses the drugs were used for. Personally, Dr Owens inspired and rooted my aspirations to go into research and lecturing. He gave me valuable advice on how to go from an undergraduate student to become a Research Scientist and provided advice on the types of universities that would best help me to reach my goal.




GABRIELLA KOUMIS GIVES TALK TO YEAR 12 OXBRIDGE HOPEFULS

MEDSOC

UCL: TARGET MEDICINE

Target Medicine Mentoring Scheme (TMMS) is a yearlong programme for Year 12 students with the potential and desire to go to Medical School. We had applied for the scheme in October, with the mentoring starting in January of Year 12 to December of Year 13. The mentoring sessions take place through the year, providing us with practical support and information to help us become a competitive candidate for Medical School. So far, we have covered: preparing to apply to Medical School, choosing the right Medical School, how to obtain work experience, personal statements, mock examinations (UKCAT and BMAT) and admissions interviews. We are grouped with approximately 15-20 other individuals, working together with current UCL medical students ranging from Years 1-5 and are further, each allocated with our own mentor to guide our way throughout the year. This is a fantastic experience and many universities offer such



widening participation schemes, or even public lectures for prospective students to participate.

Inaugural Lecture Series 2017-18

Inspiring talks from some of our brightest minds

A number of the Ashmole MedSoc Society students have been attending the King's College London medicine lecture series, which focus on specialities in medicine and are in a sense, giving an insight into the broad spectrum of medicine. Areas covered included Adult Psychiatry, Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Trauma and Orthopaedics.

The Trauma and Orthopaedics lecture was one of my favourites, because the doctor who was delivering the lecture introduced us to her speciality: the management of musculoskeletal disease, injuries and conditions, which involves cartilage and nerves, bones, joints, muscles, tendons and ligaments.

Furthermore, she highlighted the teamwork and collaboration that are vital in the world of medicine, through her work with others, such as ortho-geriatricians, laboratory scientists, nurses, phlebotomists, radiologists and microbiologists.

By giving a timeline of her medical studies and the continued examinations upon graduating, she demonstrated that becoming a doctor is a lifelong commitment, which needs to be in par with the constant technological advancements that are taking place in the medical world.

A TRIP TO THE ROYAL COLLEGE OF ANAESTHETISTS: A CAREER IN ANAESTHESIA

On 2nd March, a few of our Senior Medoc

members were lucky enough to attend a day of workshops and lectures at the Royal College of Anaesthetists in Holborn, From the variety of workshops, we gained hands-on practical experience using equipment such as endotracheal tubes and laryngoscope blades, while learning about airway management, resuscitation and the intensive care unit. We also had the opportunity to interact with a selection of state-of-the-art technologies used by anaesthetists, including practice simulations with a "Dummy" costing over £65,000.

Through the lectures focussing on 'Global Anaesthesia', 'A Career in Medicine' and 'Anaesthesia in the Military', we were exposed to the vast job opportunities within the field of medicine and specifically within the field of Anaesthesia. Throughout the day, we gained a much greater understanding of who anaesthetists are and what they do, as well as



again seeing the importance of multidisciplinary teams within the medical profession.

We began our experience at the workshop on 'Your Body Your Consent' by wandering around the Bart's Pathology Museum, in awe of the plethora of human tissue available for us to observe and learn about. The vast array of tissue had been gathered and preserved over many years and were nothing but extraordinary, including cut open mice, severed hands and feet, skeletons, and various parts of the human anatomy.

Our time looking at the exhibits had been

called to an end but our enjoyment and intrigue had not. We promptly took our seats to listen to our host Dr Mark Wilkinson, who delivered an insightful introduction to his time in Pathology and the endless perspectives of medical ethics. His talk widened our



questions provided to us in order to broaden our understanding and to gather the opinions from a variety of people, to try to mould and develop our own. YOM HASHOAH 2018

Yom HaShoah, more commonly known as Holocaust Remembrance Day, is a Jewish day of commemoration held each year on the 27th of Nisan (the first month in the Assyrian Calendar). It is an event of huge importance amongst the worldwide Jewish community, so when we received an invite from the Holocaust Education Trust (HET) to speak at Cockfosters and N. Southgate Synagogue during their Yom HaShoah service, we were honoured and immediately jumped at the opportunity.

Haowei and I first became involved with HET after being chosen to take part in the Lessons from Auschwitz project (LFA) in which we visited Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp as representatives of Ashmole Academy. We outlined what the LFA project was, what our participation entailed and what the experience of visiting such a site of mass destruction itself was like. To see in person the living conditions people had been subject to, to see piles of children's shoes that had been taken from them as they entered the camp; the gas chambers that hundreds of thousands of people had been murdered in; it was an experience so profound, yet so difficult to put into words.

The Yom HaShoah service at the Synagogue was split into Acts, moving from "Grief to Hope". We shared our reflections of our experience in Section 5 "Educating the world", where we spoke about our experiences of visiting Auschwitz. The community at the synagogue was a warm, welcoming and vibrant one, to be

place of worship and experience Jewish Culture first hand was special. Throughout the ceremony we were graced with the beautiful singing of Chazzan Jonny Turgel who led everyone (in Hebrew) in songful prayer. To speak at the Yom HaShoah service was an absolute privilege and not an experience we will be forgetting any time soon.

As young people, it is our collective duty to ensure the survivors' stories live on. Being able to speak in a synagogue was such a unique and eye opening experience for both of us, and we felt so honoured to be invited into someone else's place of worship. YEAR 12 ECONOMICS STUDENTS MEET THE GOVERNOR OF THE BANK OF ENGLAND



On Friday 18th May, myself and other students from our Year 12 Economics group travelled to Harrow School to attend a talk by Mark Carney.

He first introduced himself as being the

Governor for the Bank of England and went over his personal academic and working career. He also spoke about monetary policy and explained the instruments the Monetary Policy use in order to control inflation rates. It was great to hear his perspective on how effective these tools were and allowed us to apply the theories we have been learning in the classroom this year.

The talk was surprisingly diverse and covered an array of different topics due to the range of questions asked by the audience, such as the volatility of cryptocurrency to how the scale of household debt was partly accountable to the 2009 Financial Crash. He spoke on his personal experience and change from working

in the private financial sector at Goldman Sachs to becoming Governor of the Bank of Canada and Governor of the Bank of England. What I found most surprising was when he spoke on pay gaps and mentioned that the pay gap in the financial sector was 43%. I appreciated how during the talk when specific economic jargon arose, he made sure to explain these concepts to ensure those who were not economists were not inundated with the technical terminology used. Overall, we found the talk to be highly beneficial and interesting to see how what we learn in Economics is applied to the outside world.

IMPERIAL COLLEGE SCHOOLS SCIENCE COMPETITION WINNERS



Using Algae to generate electricity, and genetically modifying plankton to create a carbon sink, were just two ideas presented at the final of this years' Imperial College Schools Science Competition, held on 21st March 2018. There were open teams from London and the South East of England; four Ashmole Academy students from Year 7 and 8 were the youngest team to qualify for the event. They attended Imperial College in order to present their scientific solution to a global problem.

Specifically, their idea concerned the development of small hydroelectric generators for use in water taps, thus creating a source of sustainable energy for the home. Competing against older year groups did not phase the students who remained professional throughout the evening.

All the ideas presented on the evening were fantastic; however, Ashmole Academy won the judges over with a unique presentation, emerging victorious. CRIME PREVENTION

On Thursday 24th May, I attended a community event organised by an Ashmole parent regarding concerns about Southgate and crime; particularly drug related knife crime. The event was extremely well attended with representatives from politics, the police and other community leaders. Many of the attendees were from the Ashmole community. During the question and answer session towards the end of the meeting, education was mentioned numerous times as having a responsibility in this area. In light of this, I will explain the school's response to these concerns and highlight the areas where we already endeavour to ensure our pupils receive the best education and advice possible in this area.

Clearly, Ashmole itself is an extremely safe site. We have had CCTV in place since the school was built, and indeed, were one of the first schools in London to take this step. We have used scanning wands for many years and regularly perform bag searches. As you know, with concerns regarding our security at the main gate, we have now added extra access control panels and extra fence security. We have a constant staff presence at the gates both before and after school, and patrol into Southgate every day after school. As our behaviour policy clearly indicates, we will have zero tolerance of anyone who chooses to break the law within the confines of the school. Drug or knife possession will result in permanent exclusion. Unlike the comments of some at the meeting, Ashmole is a firm believer that the vast majority of the school's population who want to follow their education in a lawful and sensible manner have the right not to be exposed to those who do not. Our exclusion policy is robust in supporting this ethos.

Whilst no school can absolutely guarantee safety within its school, I am certain that we make Ashmole Academy as safe an environment as possible, a far safer environment than beyond our school.

Our educational response to these issues is multi-faceted: extended work in tutor periods including advising pupils on actions to take. This included very recent sessions specifically focusing on knife crime for all years and repeated advice throughout the year concerning mobile phone visibility and usage outside of school. PSHE lessons at Key Stage 3 have been dedicated to a variety of safety issues, including staying safe to and from school for Year 7 and a collapsed day for Year 8, with alcohol, smoking and drugs as its theme. We have also had assemblies that focus on the importance of keeping safe and offer advice to students. Within the Year 10 tutorial programme, is an explicit module dedicated to gang related violence and appropriate responses to this. An integral part of our new Ashmole values, launched at the start of the year, is the messages of cooperation and respect.

In addition, we have other measures to promote and monitor safety, including: liaison with the Safer Neighbourhood Team on a regular basis; maintaining contact with local MP's on relevant concerns and issues including safety; working with Safer London and other charity advisors on gang related violence and other safeguarding issues. We also work with community police liaison officers - Colindale is the branch we contact. For students who we have identified as at risk, we use a number of different support agencies as well as our own learning mentors and an onsite councillor.
