

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MedSoc - Surgeon's Talk

On Wednesday 25th May we had a talk by a surgeon from Athens Medical Centre today, organised by one of our Y12 students Aikaterini V. Dr Hirides joined us today via Zoom and told us a lot about his role as a robotic and laproscopic surgeon. He specialises in major abdominal surgery, including the upper GI tract, hernias, bariatric surgery and has removed tumours in the colon, just to name a few. He gave us a great insight into the use of robots in surgical procedures, and showed us some incredible videos of surgeries being performed. 23 students attended and asked lots of engaging questions at the end of the talk. Design & Technology

We are a hugely consumer-driven society, and recycling converts the things we throw away into new items, making sure that none of the energy and raw materials used to make them goes to waste. In recent years, climate emergencies have been declared and there has been an increased emphasis on the need to recycle.

To support and explore these initiatives our Textiles Year 9 students have been experimenting with different methods of Textile production such as Weaving and Applique using solely recycled fabric and card offcuts. The designs created by our students feature a range of different pattern works and are inspired by existing logos. Applique and Weaving are some of the oldest forms of design in the world, and are both still commonly used around the globe today!
